Some time ago I mused about Jack Leslie and the ship models that he made in his humble dwelling in Clam Bay. Our photo today is of him inside his home with several of his creations. We have received nine of his models from the Sunshine Coast Museum in Gibsons. They are restructuring their collections and decided these models should be returned to where they were designed and built. We are very grateful to have them and will be displaying them both in the Blubber Bay Museum and in our new branch in Van Anda. The models are of sailing ships such as the Santa Maria and HMS Bounty. The detail in these models is incredible and speaks volumes for his patience and skill. Jack served under sail in the Royal Navy as a boy and later was a logger and fisherman here on the West coast.

The Blubber Bay museum will be open for the July first long weekend from Saturday 28 June to Tuesday 1 July inclusive from 11 AM to 3 PM.
