## TEXADA'S "GERMAN PRINCE"

Newcomers to Texada used to hear rumours of a mysterious playboy "German prince" who owned a large portion of the island's forest reserves. Really?

True! In 1965 Prince Johannes von Thurn und Taxis purchased Texada Logging Ltd. Although there were around 20 different logging companies on the island at that time, the prince's main competition was another German company, TIFR (Texada Island Forest Reserve). Together they proceeded to buy up parcels of vacant private land including many old homesteads. Ernie Jago was hired as Thurn und Taxis' local manager. To prevent squatters from living in abandoned cabins many historic buildings were unfortunately torched in the 1970's.

Prince Johannes was the latest in a long line of German aristocracy. Dating back to 1440, an ancestor established a European postal system and, in the 1500's, the family amassed a fortune serving as postmasters

for the papacy and the Holy Roman Empire.

The prince's substantial local holdings included a large part of Texada and sections of Saltspring and Vancouver Islands. He also owned businesses, breweries and properties in South America and Europe including 10 palaces and castles.
